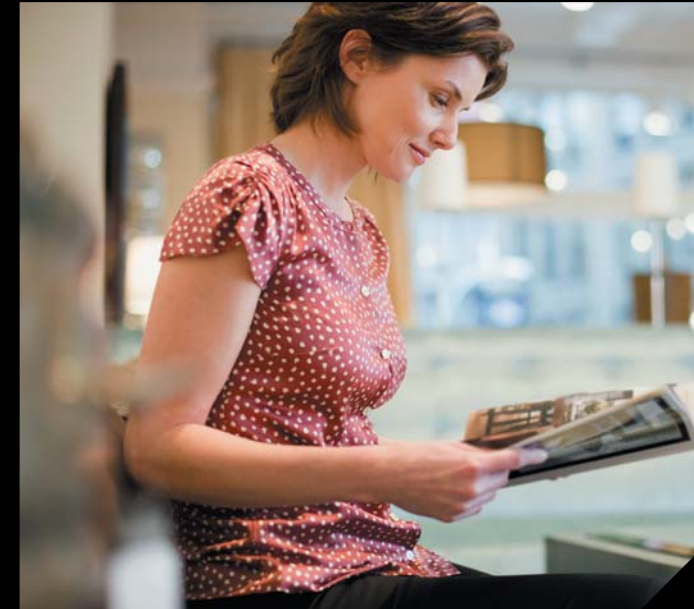

What is Liberal Arts?

Liberal Arts is a broadly based humanities course which covers areas such as literature, history, civics, environmental issues and economics as well as communication (including information technology) and study skills. It aims to develop an understanding of some of the major issues and ideas of modern society.

This course is an excellent introduction to university study in arts, humanities, social sciences, education and similar degree courses.

Why study at CAE?

CAE is the ideal environment for adults returning to study.

Course Objectives

Develop skills in areas such as: complex writing; cultural analysis; research; communication and presentation; social inquiry; information technology; and inter-cultural communication. The course enables students to develop a confident sense of identity, extends the range of possibilities learners can imagine for themselves and provides alternative and additional pathways into further study.

Pre-requisites

You are eligible to enter the Diploma course with:

- satisfactory completion of Year 12 or an approved equivalent; or
- a demonstrated capacity to study at tertiary level.

Credit may be given in recognition of prior learning (RPL).

Articulation

Successful completion of the first year of the Diploma may lead into the first year of an Arts degree at a tertiary institution. Students who complete the full Diploma are able to negotiate credits for the first year of an Arts degree with most universities, or may gain entry into an education degree. Students who complete the Diploma and gain entry into Victoria University will be exempt from the first year of an Arts degree.

Duration & Study Mode

Two years full time (or part time equivalent). Certificate IV in Liberal Arts is awarded after one year of full time study (or part time equivalent).

Assessment Procedures

Assessment is by a variety of methods including tests, assignments, essays, group work and oral presentations. Full time students may be eligible for concession fees. Proof is required to indicate that you qualify. Contact your local Centrelink office to find out about study support.

Apply essential further study skills (VBQU226) - 90hrs

Provides the knowledge and skills needed to gather information, understand and produce complex reports.

Research fields of study and enquiry (VBQU227) - 40hrs

Develop research and presentation skills utilising a variety of means: computers, conventional research and the internet.

Critique approaches to citizenship and the public sphere (VBQU228) - 90hrs

Cover political concepts such as democracy (past and present) and the development of political and legal institutions.

Analyse stories/narratives within cultures (VBQU229) - 90hrs

Be introduced to some of the major stories that have shaped civilisations across the world.

Analyse the human transformation of nature (VBQU230) - 90hrs

Explore different historical views of nature and the ways these views are represented in oral, written and visual forms.

Research approaches to economy and society (VBQU231) - 90hrs

Acquire the knowledge and skills to participate in current debates about economic policies.

Analyse a range of texts (VBQU232) - 70hrs

Explore the relationship between 'texts' (aural, visual and written) and the society in which they were produced.

Write complex documents (BSBCMN420A) - 40hrs

Prepare an extended document using more advanced word processing skills.

Create electronic presentations (BSBADM306A) - 20hrs

Learn PowerPoint and use it to create and deliver a class presentation.

Analyse tradition and modernity (VBQU233) - 180hrs

Cover social and cultural transformations including the disintegration of Feudalism; the Renaissance and revival of classical antiquity in Europe; effects of colonisation and decolonisation in Asia, and the 1940 Chinese Revolution.

Undertake academic research (VBQU234) - 80hrs

Be introduced to the principles of social research, identify an issue within a field of study, frame a research question and undertake research.

Analyse sociological understandings of human relationships (VBQU235) - 90hrs

Explore the changing relationships within family life in Australia.

Analyse urban form and culture (VBQU236) - 90hrs

Explore the evolution of cities and their different structures in Eastern and Western civilisations, from antiquity to the present day.

Analyse theories of the self (VBQU237) - 90hrs

Discuss, evaluate and compare a range of theories of personality from ancient to modern times, key concepts methodologies and the cultural contexts in which they were developed.

Analyse literary texts and genres (VBQU238) - 70hrs

Gain the knowledge and skills to demonstrate how formal structures and the perspectives of different audiences contribute to the meanings of a text and understand the roles they play.
